February 24th 2024: Two years since the illegal Russian Invasion - our friends in Eastern Ukraine are suffering.



This picture was sent to us from Pokrovsk in the Donetsk Region by our partner, Pastor Vasyl. It shows damage from rocket attacks on November 29th 2023. Ten people were injured including a baby.

The situation is becoming more and more difficult in Pokrovsk. There is constant Russian bombardment and power outages. Pastor Vasyl has asked for prayer.

Renewed Russian attacks

On December 29th, Russia launched one of its largest nights of missile and drone strikes since the war began. Many of our partners have been suffering. In Pokrovsk, eleven people, five of them children, were killed in attacks on January 6th. Eight more people were wounded. On January 8th, Pastor Sergei from Novomoskovsk asked for prayer especially for his wife and children - following rocket damage earlier in the day. Thankfully, on January 14th he wrote: 'Praise God, they are alive!' He continues: 'It's hard to endure the explosions and the danger, but my family trust God. They continue to serve people in the volunteer centre. They help IDPs with groceries and do whatever they can.'

'I went with my son to evacuate people from Krakhovo. When we came to the electrical power station, two Russian rockets hit! Oh, how they want to give us nightmares! This is today's reality for residents.' Pastor Vasyl





Joshua writes: The DHM team wishes all our partners and supporters a blessed new year. The Ukrainian people are undergoing the whole horror of a brutal and relentless Russian attack, but the faith of our Ukrainian friends continues to inspire our respect and admiration. 


- Please pray for all military chaplains, as they support the soldiers on the front lines; minister to the wounded;

Aleksei has been working non-stop distributing gifts to children and humanitarian aid to soldiers and households near the front



lines. As an army chaplain he risks his life daily and he writes: 'Our defenders are part of our population whose needs are never ending, including in the most basic needs. These are the people on whom our victory depends, people who put their lives on the line for our freedom. It's so important to support our guys!!' Aleksei has also been sharing videos about atrocities which took place in the village of Miroliubovka, near Kherson in September. Pray for the family of little 'Viktoria' who died. Aleksei reports that 'even the Russian soldiers wept over the child'. A witness to the killing says that the tears make no difference but one of our trustees, Mary, has pointed out 'Maybe the tears are the answers to our prayers?' From Deacon Yevhenii, Dnipro Independent Church

Deacon Yevhenii from Dnipro Independent Baptist Church sent us these photographs of Christmas activities in the church. He says: 'Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! May the Lord bless you and keep you and may our Lord grant you joy, peace and love. Thank you for your prayers and all the help you provide for Ukraine and for us. I am sending you some photos of how we spent Christmas for the children. Say hello to all mission trustees and those who know us and pray for us!' Over 90 children attended the Christmas Party mostly from IDP families who do not usually attend church.





Yevhenii's wife, Polina returned to Ukraine with their two children, for the first time since the war began. Like many other areas of Ukraine, Dnipro was hit by the renewed missile and drone attacks. Please keep the city of Dnipro in your prayers. On January 14th, residents remembered the Russian missile attack exactly one year ago which left 46 dead, among them 6 children, and over 80 people were injured. Seven people died and 29 were injured in the 29th December 2023 attacks. Dnipro was also hit by missiles on January 13th.

A message from Pastor Mykhailo, Dnipro Central Baptist Church: 'We have been holding our winter camp. There are at least 10 kids here who have never been to a Christian camp. One girl declared herself to be an atheist, but yesterday she changed her mind! Keep praying for us.'

A Christmas message from Rev Dr Roman Soloviy

The terrible suffering of Ukrainians caused by the illegal invasion of Ukraine by the Russian Federation almost two years ago continues - though we see little of it in our media. Even the UN is pleading *'Please do not forget Ukraine.'*Our friend Rev. Dr. Roman Soloviy, Rector of the Eastern European Institute of Theology in Lviv graphically describes the situation and mood in Ukraine in this extract from his 'Not-so-Spiritual Christmas Reflections':

Dear friends,

This year, I didn't send any Christmas greetings to anyone, and I received very few myself. This fact doesn't surprise me; I almost take it for granted. I have a strong feeling that Christmas, like many other things from our past, has been taken away from us Ukrainians. Or maybe I'm wrong, and it, along with all our pre-war life, vanished without a trace in the smoke of war. Perhaps it left us to avoid hearing the cries of the wounded, the widows, and the orphans or to avoid seeing the thousands of destroyed towns and villages where no one lives anymore and no one will return. Maybe Christmas couldn't bear with despair and hopelessness slowly taking over our country like a poisonous fog. Who knows?

That first Christmas was not very joyful either. Jesus was born in an occupied country that was given over to the local collaborator and despot Herod. Christ was born on the move, like many Ukrainian children born in the basements of bombed-out maternity wards and hospitals in Mariupol, Izyum, or Vuhledar. Unlike that first Christmas, however, it was not the singing of angels, but the cries of the dying that were heard there, and it was not wise men rushing from the east to worship the child but Russian soldiers guided by the evil star of hatred. Like Jesus, millions of Ukrainian children had to flee from their homes to foreign countries. Almost seven hundred of them failed to do so and will never grow up. The pain of their mothers can only be compared to the pain of those tens of thousands of mothers whose sons and daughters will never return from the war because they laid down their lives for the sake of those they love.....

That first Christmas happened at night. What do you associate with the night at Christmas? Perhaps with the bright light of festive illuminations? With the bottomless starry sky? Flying to your family on a fast plane? The only planes I can see in our skies are old Ukrainian military aircraft heading for the airport nearby. And I will probably associate the night for the rest of my life with reports of yet another group of missiles and drones attacking Ukraine, destroying infrastructure and ports and killing civilians. Even as I write these words, two groups of drones are attacking Ukraine from the south and north. The night is a time of curfew, the silence of which is broken only by the piercing sound of ambulances carrying wounded soldiers. But night and darkness are not only astronomical but also metaphysical, or, if you like, spiritual phenomena. It is the night of hopelessness that is enveloping the hearts of Ukrainians more and more tightly - we are at war with a country that has set itself the goal of destroying us. Every time Russia has defeated Ukraine in a war, it has ended in the destruction of Ukrainians, famine, torture and deportation. Is this what awaits us again? It is the night of despair - the free world's help to Ukraine is in question, and without it, we have no chance of preserving our state and the right to live on this land. It is the night of distrust, which splits society along dozens of lines that no one knows how to close together. It is the night of fatigue that only the Ukrainian military truly feels, but in its way, it has crept into the soul of each of us. It is the night of uncertainty. A night of fear. A night of pain. A night like death.'

Dr Soloviy ends his message with some words of hope: 'At the same time, Christmas is primarily about God coming into this dark, awkward, dangerous world. He shares all the burdens and pains of our existence. He knows the fatigue and agony of death. He knows the terror of the night and the despair of loneliness. And he expects that, as He has entered the darkness of our existence, we will dare to walk with others on their journey through the night.'

News and Reflections from Pastors Alexander and Sasha





Please pray for Pastor Sasha and Iryna.

We are so grateful to Epsom Baptist Church. They bought a minibus for Pasta Sasha in 2017. Since the war started it has been in constant use by the Vasilkyvka Baptist Church community particularly for transporting humanitarian supplies and displaced people. It needs frequent repair and is no longer reliable for long journeys close to the front line. Epsom Baptist Church have again donated funds which will enable us to provide Vasilkyvka with a younger minibus at which point the existing minibus will be made available to a local ministry partner for shorter distance journeys. Please pray as we search for the right vehicle and deal with changing regulations for importing a vehicle into Ukraine.

Tsarichanka Care Home

DHM ministry partner, Pastor Oleksandr, and his team visited residents of a nearby care home in Eastern Ukraine today (Jan. 22nd).

They gave gifts (all paid for by DHM donations) to all the nearly 160 residents.



Oleksandr sent us this message: "Greetings DEAR FRIENDS!!! PRAISE THE LORD! We held a service in the care home for people with disabilities And your contribution was included in this ministry!!!"
